## HOPE FOR A SWEET FRIEND



David is a client that we have been working with for the last 3 year, specifically one of our homeless response team members, Heather. This is David's story from Heather's POV. "This client started out as a missing person and after some time the client and I were able to discuss this and get in contact with his family even though he had no intention of ever going back. This client has declined rapidly due to the wear and tear of the streets, but has maintained a close relationship with me and other members of my team. The relationship with David's sister and I has grown as well, helping to support each other with information and encouragement as we try to meet him where he's at, but also try to help in whatever ways we can.

Last year, David fell from a 3 story building and broke his back, with doctors saying he would never walk again. However, after visiting this client in the hospital and leaving the hospital, the next time I would see this client he would be riding up to me on a bike. As usual defeating the odds. In recent days this client has endured another traumatic event. After being severely beaten, parts of his skull removed, and in a coma, he had been once again deemed to never recover or even wake up.

My partner and I went to visit our friend, hoping that inside somewhere he would hear us and be encouraged. Hours after we left, his sister called saying that he had woken up and was able to breathe on his own. In the days to follow, he would ask for his friends (our Homeless Response Team) and cry when we would arrive telling us how much he loves us. He is remembering faces, his favorite songs, and how to swallow real food. Just as recent as Friday, when I went for a visit...he said my name...."Heather, she is my friend". Our connection to these clients is irreplaceable and our team is grateful God uses us as a pathway to strength for our folks. He is recovering well and this tragic incident has brought his family back into his life. He will be moving in with his sister who is a nurse and can care for him. CAM's relationship and communication with his family has meant that this tragedy has turned into a miracle. This young man will no longer be on the streets!"

## Texas Homeless Network Award

CAM's Homeless Response Team has been awarded the statewide 2024 Texas Homeless Network (THN) Award for Outstanding Community Organization of the Year! For over 25 years, THN has recognized and celebrated organizations making a significant impact in ending homelessness within their communities. This year, THN said that CAM stood out for



its remarkable efforts during the COVID-19 pandemic, transforming into the homeless HUB for the unsheltered street homeless in San Antonio. They also went on to say that CAM's innovative "One Life at a Time" approach, in collaboration with SAPD, mental health units, the DA's office, and long-term supportive housing, has been instrumental in serving the most vulnerable and chronically homeless individuals. This work not only supports those in need but also educates and shifts the mindset of San Antonio citizens on how to address homelessness compassionately and systemically. This year I had the opportunity to interview a client that has a home but sometimes just needs a little help to pay a bill or groceries to help her get by until her next pay check. I had the opportunity to meet a gentleman who had been incarcerated, served his time, been released, had gotten a job, and now has found a place to live. CAM helped him with his ID and work clothes. I also had a chance to meet a mom with a developmental disability who needed a birth certificate (help paying for it) because she and her son had qualified for subsidized housing and they needed this to move in. She works hard to care for herself and her son despite her disability. There were several others that all had different reasons for needing short term help or ongoing support that CAM was able to be there for. Their generosity in sharing their stories is something I wanted to share with you. Sometimes the overall need can seem overwhelming, as 200,000 people live at

or below the poverty level in San Antonio. However, when you take each person's story and the little ways we can help, it can be so hopeful.
